These Trails in Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire are relics of the area's industrial past, being remnants of railway lines that served the coal mining activities of the region.

Now reclaimed by human intervention and natural regeneration, the Trails Network offers opportunities for walking, cycling and horse riding (refer to Key for relevant section information).

The most significant features of the Trails today are the abundant areas of wildlife value, including mature oak and ash woodlands, wildflower meadows, limestone grassland terraces and recently created pools and wetlands.

Illustrated on the map are examples of the wildlife most commonly seen, though these are only a small sample of the natural treasures to be enjoyed along the Trails.
