**2011 Census
(Leadership and Culture)**

1. Purpose of the Report

To inform Cabinet about the key findings for Derbyshire from the first and second 2011 Census data releases.

2. Information and Analysis

Background

Every ten years the ONS carries out a Census in England and Wales as part of its programme for understanding life in the UK. The 2011 Census took place on 27 March 2011. Around 25 million households were issued with a questionnaire designed to collect statistics about households, health, migration, ethnic groups and national identity, religion, qualifications, employment, transport and visitors. 96% of households in Derbyshire responded to the Census providing a wealth of detailed information about Derbyshire and its people. This information can be used to ensure that local services people rely upon such as transport, housing, schools and hospitals, are provided where they are needed.

The first two sets of 2011 Census results were released between July and December 2012 at local authority level and above. The key findings for Derbyshire are as follows:

Population

- On Census day the Derbyshire population stood at 769,700. This is an increase of 5% since the last Census in 2001. Overall the rate of population growth in Derbyshire is lower than that for the East Midlands (9%) and for England (8%).
- Around 77% of the rise in Derbyshire's population is from residents born within the UK and 23% from residents born outside of the UK. This is in stark contrast to the pattern across England where almost three quarters of the population increase is from residents born outside of the UK and a quarter from residents born within the UK.
- Children aged 0-14 represented 16% of Derbyshire's population, lower than both the East Midlands (17%) and England (18%).

- The proportion of pre-school age population has increased slightly, whilst the number of school age children (5-14) has declined, a factor that will need to be considered when planning children's services across the county.
- The number of people aged 65+ in the county has grown, representing 19% of the Derbyshire Population. This is higher than both East Midlands (17%) and England (16%). The increase in the number of older people in the county could have significant implications for older people's services in Derbyshire.
- The largest growth in population among Derbyshire's eight districts has been in South Derbyshire with an increase of 16% since 2001. In contrast the population of High Peak grew by just 2%. This may place an increased demand on the supply of housing and local services in the south of the county.
- Most residents in Derbyshire belong to the White British Group (96%). The county's black and minority ethnic (BME) population has increased slightly from 3% in 2001 to 4% in 2011. Although this is relatively small compared with England it equates to over 32,000 people in Derbyshire. Ensuring council policies and services are responsive to the needs of BME communities will be of increasing importance as the number of non-UK born residents and the population from BME communities increases.

Households

- 13% of all households in Derbyshire were single pensioners living on their own, slightly above the national average of 12%. Across the county this varied from 10% in South Derbyshire to 15% in Derbyshire Dales. The number of pensioner households is expected to increase which will have implications for older people's services in Derbyshire.
- 6% of households in the county were lone parent households. Whilst this is below both the regional and national average of 7%, Derbyshire has seen a higher percentage increase (24%) since 2001. It is common for divorce rates to increase during difficult economic times which may have contributed to the increase in lone parent households across the county. The rise in lone parent households will have implications for children's services in Derbyshire. The districts of Chesterfield and Erewash have the highest percentage of lone parent households (7%). In South Derbyshire there has been a 53% percentage increase in lone parent households. This is likely to be due to the large increase in the total number of households over recent years and the younger age structure of the district.
- Overall, Derbyshire had a lower than average percentage of households with dependent children (3%) where no adult was in employment compared to England (4%). However, this varied across the county from 5% of households in Bolsover to just 2% of households in Derbyshire Dales.

Health

- Four out of five residents in Derbyshire (79%) described themselves as being in good or very good health. However, 6% of residents described their health as bad/very bad, just above the England average of 5%.
- Derbyshire had slightly more (12%) people providing unpaid care for someone with an illness or disability than England (10%). A third of these people provided more than 20 hours care a week in Derbyshire, an increase of 5 percentage points since 2001.

Housing

- Home ownership levels in Derbyshire remained above the national average. However, less people in Derbyshire owned their own home with a mortgage or loan in 2011 than in 2001. The decline could be due to the county's higher number of older people reaching the age where they own their homes outright. Access to credit may be an issue in areas that experience high levels of income deprivation such as Erewash an area that had a percentage change of -11% in homeownership with a mortgage or loan.
- The number of households living in private rented accommodation in Derbyshire increased considerably from 7% in 2001 to 12% in 2011, although the figure remained well below the national average.
- The proportion of households with no access to a car or van declined over the decade whereas the proportion with two or more cars has risen, a similar pattern to the national picture.

Workforce

- Overall labour market participation in Derbyshire has increased since 2001. The economic activity rate in Derbyshire in 2011 was 70% the same as the national average.
- Part-time employment in the county increased by over 4% as the levels of full-time employment decreased. This change may in part be linked to the economic downturn where people have had the number of hours they work reduced due to efficiency saving. Recent research undertaken by the ONS supports this, highlighting the issue of underemployment where people are working fewer hours than they would like to.
- Over the last ten years the occupational structure of Derbyshire's population has improved suggesting there is a greater demand for higher level skills in the county. The percentage of residents working in professional occupations has increased by five percentage points and the proportion working in manual occupations has reduced by four percentage points. A contributing factor to this may be the continued decline in employment in the manufacturing sector.

Education

- The qualification levels of Derbyshire's population have greatly improved over the last decade with the proportion of people qualified to degree level or above having increased by 8 percentage points to 24%.

However, this is below the national average of 27%. Additionally, over a quarter (26%) of the county's population have no qualifications, slightly higher than the England average of 23%. Continuing to improve the skills level of Derbyshire's workforce in order to enhance the county's economic performance and attract investment into the area remains a key priority.

More detailed 2011 Census data is available in the attached briefing note in Appendix 1. A summary profile of key census statistics for Derbyshire is also available in Appendix 2. District level summary profiles and a detailed glossary can also be found on the Derbyshire Observatory website.

In addition to the summary profile a number of topic based profiles (population, households, dwellings, economic activity, health, equalities and change over time) at county and district level will be made available.

Following the release of the detailed census statistics for small areas the Policy and Research Division will also provide:

- An information pack for Councillors containing summary and topic based profiles for each Electoral Division (based on the new Electoral Division boundaries);
- Summary and topic based profiles at ward level; and
- A Census Atlas at ward level.

Further Census information will be made available on the Derbyshire Observatory website as it is released by ONS.

2011 Census: Briefing Note 1

Research & Information, Chief Executive's

The 2011 Census of Population took place on Sunday 27 March 2011 in England and Wales. It was carried out by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) as part of its programme for understanding life in the UK. Around 25 million households were issued with a questionnaire designed to collect detailed information about where people live, what they do for a living, what sort of homes and families they have, their general health, their educational attainment and how these factors have changed over time. A 96% response rate was achieved in Derbyshire, this compares to a 94% response rate nationally. This briefing note contains analysis of the first release of 2011 Census data which includes population data for the administrative county of Derbyshire by age and household data by district. A summary of population change since 2001 is also included. Please note that all figures are rounded to the nearest 100. The key findings for Derbyshire are as follows:

- The Derbyshire population stood at 769,700 on Census day; an increase of 35,100 since the last Census in 2001. Overall the rate of population growth in Derbyshire was 4.8% which is lower than that of the East Midlands (8.7%) and England (7.9%).
- Children aged 0-14 represented 16.4% of Derbyshire's population, lower than both the East Midlands (17.3%) and England (17.7%).
- The proportion of pre-school age population has increased slightly, whilst the number of school age children (5-14) has declined, a factor that will need to be considered when planning children's services across the county.
- The number of people aged 65+ in the county has grown, representing 18.6% of Derbyshire's population. This is a higher percentage than for the East Midlands (17.1%) and England (16.3%). The number of people aged 85+ has also increased and represents 2.4% of the population in Derbyshire, compared to 2.2% nationally and regionally. The increase in the number of older people in the county could have significant implications for older people's services in Derbyshire.
- The largest growth in population among Derbyshire's eight districts has been in South Derbyshire with an increase of 15.9% since 2001. In contrast, the population of High Peak increased by just 1.7%. This may place an increased demand on the supply of housing and local services in the south of the county.
- 2011 Census figures show there were 332,600 households in the administrative county of Derbyshire. This represents an increase of 7.7% since 2001 and is in line with the increase for England (7.9%) but below that of the East Midlands (9.4%).



Total population within Derbyshire (2011)

The total population of Derbyshire on Census day was 769,700. Derbyshire is the second highest populated county in the East Midlands next to Nottinghamshire.

Population change (2001 to 2011)

Between 2001 and 2011 Derbyshire's population grew at a slower rate than both the East Midlands region and England. There was an increase of 35,100 (4.8%) in the population of Derbyshire, 361,000 (8.7%) in the East Midlands and 3,873,700 (7.9%) in England.

- All eight districts within Derbyshire experienced some degree of population increase between 2001 and 2011.
- The district with the greatest percentage increase was South Derbyshire (15.9%). In contrast the district of High Peak has had a population growth of just 1.7%.
- Of the five shire counties within the East Midlands, Derbyshire has had the lowest population increase (4.8%) and Lincolnshire the highest (10.4%).

Population within Derbyshire by age band (2011)

The age structure of Derbyshire's population is older than both the East Midlands and England, there are lower numbers of younger people within the county when compared to the national age profile. South Derbyshire has the highest younger population and Derbyshire Dales and North East Derbyshire have lower numbers of pre-school children. The table below shows the distribution of various age groups in the population.

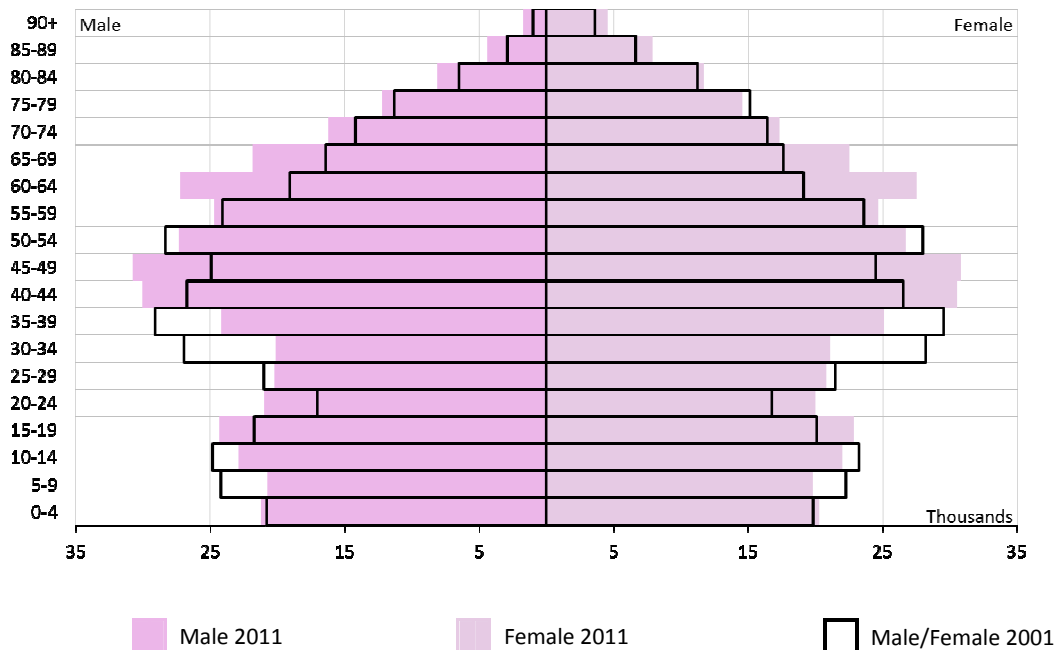
- Derbyshire has a smaller proportion of children of pre-school (0-4 years) and primary school (5-9 years) age compared to both the East Midlands and England.
- 40-49 year olds make up a greater percentage of the population within Derbyshire as they do for the East Midlands and England.
- 18.6% of Derbyshire's population are aged 65+, higher than both the East Midlands (17.1%) and England (16.3%).
- There are just over twice as many females (12,500) aged 85+ than there are males (6,100), this is slightly different to 2001 when there were nearly three times as many females to males.
- The age structure of the population differs greatly across the county. Derbyshire Dales has the greatest proportion of those aged 50+ and South Derbyshire has the youngest population.



Population by age bands in Derbyshire (2001 and 2011)

The graphical illustration below is called a population pyramid. The coloured bars show the number of males and females in 2011. The black outlined bars show the number of males and females in 2001. This allows us to see which age groups have increased/decreased within Derbyshire's population between 2001 and 2011.

Derbyshire Population Pyramid (2001-2011)



- The number of children aged 0-4 increased slightly (2.0%) but there has been a reduction in both the 5-9 (-12.8%) and 10-14 year olds (-6.4%) since 2001.
- There has been an increase in younger adults in both the 15-19 (12.8%) and 20-24 (21.6%) year old age groups.
- The largest population decrease between 2001 and 2011 was of Derbyshire's 30-34 year old males (-25.2%) and females (-25.1%). The largest increase of persons between 2001 and 2011 within Derbyshire was 60-64 year olds (43.1%).
- Derbyshire's population has a much older age structure than both the region and England and has shown large increases in the numbers of males and females aged over retirement age.
- There were higher numbers of older aged (65+) females than males in both 2001 and 2011, however the largest percentage increase between 2001 and 2011 was males aged 90+ (64.7%).

Household change (2001 to 2011)

Population growth is the biggest driver of household growth. The number of households in Derbyshire at the 2011 Census has increased by 23,700 (7.7%). This growth is similar to that for England (7.9%) but below that for the East Midlands (9.4%). Across the county household growth varies considerably with South Derbyshire having the largest increase in households 18.2% and High Peak (5.0%) and Erewash (5.4%) the lowest replicating the population growth.

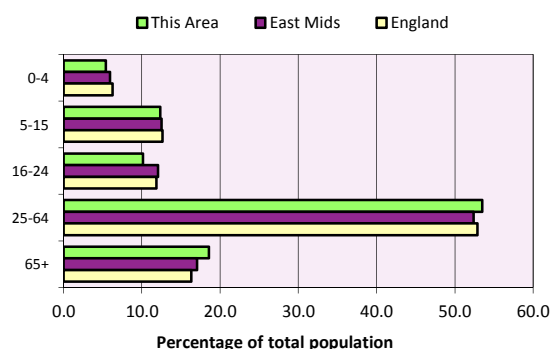

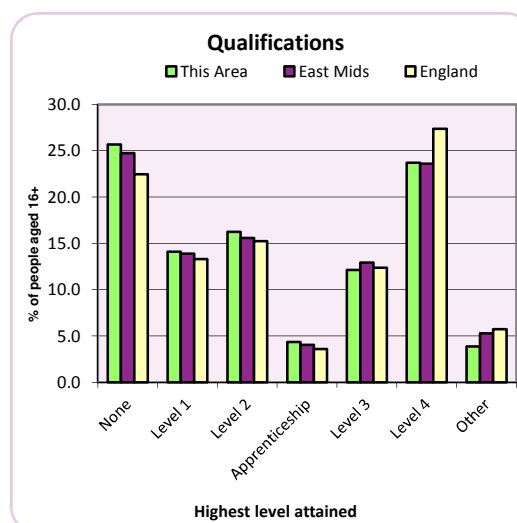

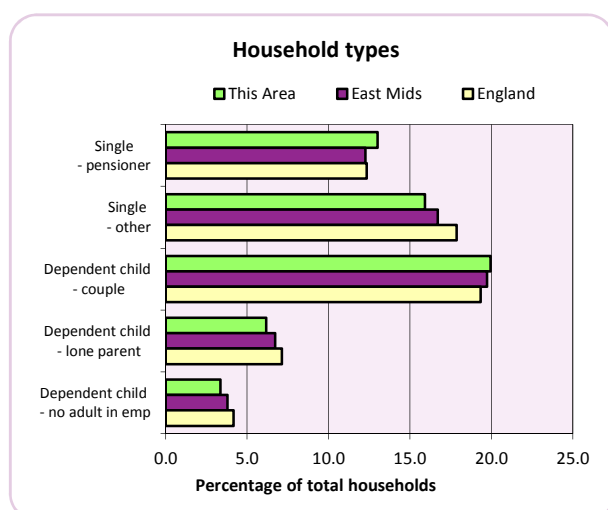

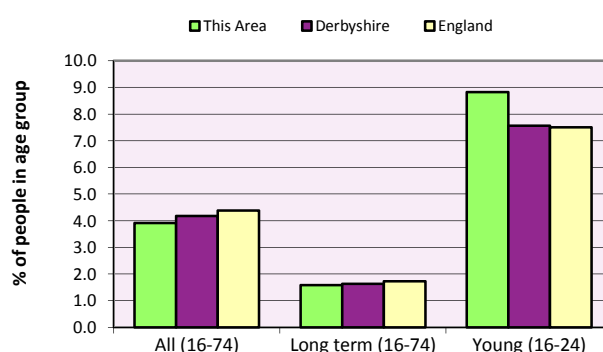
