HEALTH AND WELLBEING BOARD ROUND-UP REPORT

1. Purpose of the report

To provide the Board with a round-up of key progress in relation to Health and Wellbeing issues and projects not covered elsewhere on the agenda.

2. Round-Up

Care Quality Commission publishes annual state of care report.

The Care Quality Commission has published it's annual state of care report. The analysis finds that:

- Most services provide people with good care, but variation exists. Some care services are closing, increasing pressure on other services including GPs and hospitals.
- Around three-quarters of NHS services, care homes, general practices and other services that had been rated as 'inadequate' were able to improve their ratings following re-inspection.
- Although some health and care services are improving, there is also evidence that some services are failing to improve and there is some deterioration in quality.
- The sustainability of the adult social care market is approaching a tipping point. This view is based on the evidence of inspections, information received through our market oversight function, and external data.
- The fragility of the adult social care market is now beginning to impact both on the people who rely on these services and on the performance of NHS care. The combination of a growing and ageing population, more people with long-term conditions, and a challenging economic climate means greater demand on services and more problems for people in accessing care.
- This is translating to increased A&E attendances, emergency admissions and delays to people leaving hospital, which in turn is affecting the ability of a growing number of trusts to meet their performance and financial targets.

A digital NHS

The Kings Fund has published [A digital NHS? an introduction to the digital agenda and plans for implementation](#). This briefing seeks to make sense of the national policy agenda regarding how the NHS uses digital technology. It provides a context for leaders developing local plans and a broad assessment of progress so far, including an analysis of the remaining barriers to progress as well as the opportunities for overcoming them. It draws on key policy documents, a literature review and quantitative data published by national bodies.

Funding to expanding the mental health workforce for children and young people

Health Education England (HEE) has received funding from the Department of Health to support NHS England in meeting national targets to [expand the workforce providing children and young people's mental health services](#). HEE has published information for service providers within and outside the NHS in England who wish to express their interest in accessing a fully-funded scheme to employ and train new staff to provide

Social care for older people: home truths

The Nuffield Trust and Kings Fund have published a [joint report](#) which considers the impact of changes in local authority spending on social care for older people. The picture that emerges is of social care under huge pressure, leaving older people, their families and carers to pick up the pieces. Key themes from the report include:

- First, no one has a full picture of what has been happening to older people and their carers as local authority-funded social care has taken a battering from austerity. Although it is clear that fewer people are now eligible for social care than in the past, we do not know how well they have managed to put in place support for themselves, or at what cost to their carers' and family members' health and wellbeing.
- Second, the gap in experience between those people who happen to have their own resources, or live in an area with more social care, and those who do not has widened. As we have seen, the gap will be greatest in those places where local authorities have been least able to sustain spending levels. In other words, an unfair situation has become worse.
- Third, local authorities' vision of an enabled, independent older citizen, supported at home by family and community, turning to the state for care only in extremis, requires a vibrant voluntary and community sector, family members able and willing to play that role, and health and care services fully geared up to support people in their homes. We have not found evidence of these things being in place.

House of Commons Health Select Committee considers Public health post 2013.

The [report](#) is the result of a short inquiry on the impact of the Health and Social Care Act reforms on the public health landscape. The report warns of risks of widening health inequalities and false economy due to cuts in both local government and public health budgets. The report calls to greater and bolder action to tackle a range of public health issues, including childhood obesity.

Health in all policies

The Local Government Association has published [Health in All Policies: a manual for local government](#). This manual brings together the arguments for a Health in All Policies (HiAP) approach with practical suggestions for development at the local level. It aims to help councils to review their policy development and practice across the board, with the ultimate objective of improving health and wellbeing outcomes for the people they serve. The report makes specific recommendations about the role of health and wellbeing boards:

- As important governance structures, in being the body to which a HiAP steering group and/or specific projects report.
- By advocating a HiAP approach in Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategies,
- Through HWB members may acting as HiAP champions.

Mental health survey published

NHS Digital, formerly the Health and Social Care Information Centre, have published [the results of the latest The Adult Psychiatric Morbidity Survey](#) (APMS) survey. Key findings from the survey included:

- One in three adults aged 16-74 (37 per cent) with conditions such as anxiety or depression, surveyed in England, were accessing mental health treatment, in 2014. This figure has increased from one in four (24 per cent) since the last survey was carried out in 2007.
- Overall, around one in six adults (17 per cent) surveyed in England met the criteria for a common mental disorder (CMD) in 2014.
- Women were more likely than men to have reported CMD symptoms. One in five women (19 per cent) had reported CMD symptoms, compared with one in eight men (12 per cent). Women were also more likely than men to report severe symptoms of CMD - 10 per cent of women surveyed reported severe symptoms compared to 6 per cent of men

Social action to support older people

The Nuffield Trust has published [Harnessing social action to support older people](#). This research report present the findings of an evaluation of seven social action projects designed to use volunteers to offer support to older people, improve their wellbeing and increase their capacity to live

independently. The projects were funded from the Reducing Winter Pressures Fund. The report describes the projects; the challenges faced in setting up services; the impact of these projects on subsequent hospital use; and the experience that older people, volunteers and NHS staff had with the projects.

Healthwatch annual report

Healthwatch England has published its annual report for 2015-16 [Every voice matters: putting people at the heart of care](#). This report outlines the ways in which the Healthwatch network has worked with people from across the country to inform how services are being improved. In 2015/16, the 152 local Healthwatch across England engaged over 380,000 people to find out their views about health and social care, and helped to signpost a further 220,000 people to the right place for their needs.

Happiness and wellbeing statistics released

The Office of National Statistics have published the latest results, via a series of [interactive tools](#), from their annual wellbeing survey. The survey asks several personal well-being questions, which are:

- Overall, how satisfied are you with your life nowadays?
- Overall, to what extent do you feel the things you do in your life are worthwhile?
- Overall, how happy did you feel yesterday?
- Overall, how anxious did you feel yesterday?
- People are asked to respond on a scale of 0 to 10, where 0 is “not at all” and 10 is “completely”.

Headline results for 2015/16 for Derbyshire include:

- Worthwhile: England 7.83, East Midlands 7.91, Derbyshire 8.01, Amber Valley 8.20, Bolsover 7.91, Chesterfield 7.89, Derbyshire Dales 8.13, Erewash 8.04, High Peak 8.08, North East Derbyshire 7.78, South Derbyshire 8.07.
- Happiness: England 7.47, East Midlands 7.57, Derbyshire 7.67, Amber Valley 7.93, Bolsover 7.20, Chesterfield 7.90, Derbyshire Dales 7.90, Erewash 7.74, High Peak 7.71, North East Derbyshire 7.31, South Derbyshire 7.55.
- Anxiety: England 2.87, East Midlands 2.75, Derbyshire 2.75, Amber Valley 2.18, Bolsover 3.50, Chesterfield 2.54, Derbyshire Dales 2.58, Erewash 2.39, High Peak 2.61, North East Derbyshire 3.01, South Derbyshire 3.51.

Derbyshire Dales was ranked as the fourth highest local authority area for life satisfaction.

NHS planning guidance for 2017/18 and 2018/19 published

NHS England and NHS Improvement [have published operational and contracting planning guidance](#) covering a two year period to 2019.

For the first time, the planning guidance covers two financial years, to provide greater stability and support transformation. This is underpinned by a two-year tariff and two-year NHS Standard Contract.

It provides local NHS organisations with an update on the national priorities for 2017/18 and 2018/19, as well as updating on longer term financial challenges for local systems.
