HEALTH AND WELLBEING BOARD ROUND-UP REPORT

1. Purpose of the report

To provide the Board with a round-up of key progress in relation to Health and Wellbeing issues and projects not covered elsewhere on the agenda.

2. Round-Up

Exploring How the Role of an Enhanced Care Worker Could Address Skills Shortages in the Social Care Sector

A [new report from the International Longevity Centre](#), commissioned by the Department for Health, examines a newly developed role in the adult social care sector of Enhanced Care Worker. This role has the potential to provide the skills necessary to meet the challenges posed by ever increasing care demands. The report features interviews with individuals at all levels of the care home sector, focuses on the characteristics of this emerging role and how the Enhanced Care Worker compares to existing and previous role. It concludes by considering how to best implement the new role.

Place based Market Shaping

The Institute for Public Care has published details of a Market Shaping Review to help commissioners and providers work together, take stock of progress, and highlight good market shaping practice around the country. As part of a suite of six papers the IPC has published a report which considers [Place-based Market Shaping](#) and explores the importance of such an approach to shaping the health and care market and considers the implications for health and social care organisations. It maps the breadth of current relationships between commissioning agencies and examines their relative strengths and weaknesses.

Transforming care

The LGA has published a [report](#) 'Transforming Care' which is aimed at those staff with lead responsibility for providing services to people with learning or mental health issues. The report acts as a check list to ensure services are doing everything they can to ensure safeguarding and promote the wellbeing

of people of all ages with learning disabilities and/or autism who display behaviour that challenges, including those with a mental health condition.

A new future for social care

The Kings Fund has released presentations of a [conference](#) which looked at good practice approaches to meeting care and support needs. The discussions centred on how the social care sector can respond positively to the range of challenges facing services both now and in the future

Not seen, not heard

The Care Quality Commission has published a [report](#), following a review which looked into how effectively health services provide early help to children in need, how they identify and protect children at risk of harm and looked-after children's health and wellbeing. The report presents findings from 50 local authority area inspections across England, as well as focus groups. The report recommends:

- Children and young people must be actively engaged in their care.
- Services must ensure their focus is on outcomes.
- More is done to identify children at risk of harm.
- Children and young people must have access to the emotional and mental health support they need.

The NHS if...

The Kings Fund has released a collection of [essays](#) that explores hypothetical scenarios and their impact on the future of health and care. The essays include:

- What if 'assisted dying' were legalised?
- What if there were community services for older people 24/7?
- What if Beveridge were reporting today?
- What if the NHS were to go carbon neutral?
- What if every patient were to have their genome mapped?
- What if everyone over 55 was offered a pill to prevent heart attacks and strokes?
- What if people controlled their own health data?

Local empowerment – how to achieve a sustainable health and care service

This [report from Localis](#) considers the approach to health devolution and suggests that deals should be directly negotiated with Government and suggests a number of specific items are included. These include, approaches to open book accounting, creating new local incentives to encourage integration, fixed five year budgets for CCGs, mutualised staffing structures, local authority business rate discounts for companies that promote health and wellbeing, devolved health taxes and freedom to alter the social care precept level. The Government should buy out NHS-brokered PFI loans from affected

trusts in local areas, providing a more reasonable repayment rate and finally, deals should flow from the bottom up rather than being imposed from above, perhaps along Sustainability and Transformation planning footprints.

PHE data and analysis tools

Public Health England (PHE) has published a single point of access to [data](#) and analysis tools from across (previously known as the 'Data and knowledge gateway'). The resources help local government and health service professionals make decisions and plans to improve people's health and reduce inequalities in their area. They can be used by anyone with an interest in understanding the health of the population and how it varies across the country. PHE's health data and analysis [tools](#) for planning public health services, is also available categorised by A to Z.

Public Health Outcomes Framework 2016 to 2019

The Department of Health has published the [framework](#) which sets out desired outcomes for public health and how they will be measured.

The [Public Health Outcomes Framework](#) concentrates on:

- Increased healthy life expectancy.
- Reduced differences in life expectancy.
- Healthy life expectancy between communities.

The document sets out the technical specifications of the indicators in the revised Public Health Outcomes Framework. Local authorities must consider this document when carrying out their public health functions. Following a consultation on the Public Health Outcomes Framework, it was decided that some existing indicators and sub-indicators would be revised, replaced or removed. Details of the changes and the reasons behind them are in the [government response to the consultation](#).

Childhood obesity plan

Public Health England has published [Childhood obesity: a plan for action](#). This document outlines the government's plan for action to reduce childhood obesity by supporting healthier choices. These include encouraging industry to cut the amount of sugar in food and drinks and supporting primary school children to eat more healthily and stay active.
