HEALTH AND WELLBEING BOARD ROUND-UP REPORT

1. Purpose of the report

To provide the Board with a round-up of key progress in relation to Health and Wellbeing issues and projects not covered elsewhere on the agenda.

2. Round-Up

Prevention in action

This report argues that local authorities in England must do more in their areas to provide services that prevent, reduce or delay the need for care and support. The report analyses the impact of the Care Act on the provision of preventive services and finds that the Act's vision for prevention is not being fully realised. The report provides a national picture of local developments and highlights areas of good practice alongside areas for improvement.

State of care in 2017

The Care Quality Commission has published The state of health care and adult social care in England 2016/17. This report provides an analysis of the quality of health and social care in England based on the first full round of rated inspections covering nearly 29,000 services. It shows that the quality of care has been maintained despite challenges and the majority of people are receiving good quality care.

The Local Government Association has also published a State of the Nation Report for social care which considers the current state of the market and outlines a number of challenges which the Government should consider moving forward.

Leaving hospital or care settings

Healthwatch has published What happens when people leave hospital and other care settings? Findings from the Healthwatch network. This briefing brings together a summary of the experiences over 2000 people have shared with local Healthwatch during the last two years relating to leaving hospital and other care settings. Although there are many positive experiences, the

briefing highlights there is still significant work to be done to ensure discharge is a good experience for everyone.

Getting into shape: delivering a workforce for integrated care

Reform has published a report which makes recommendations designed to build a workforce for integrated care. The report highlights cultural factors that divert trainees away from high-need specialities and describes barriers preventing some staff from utilising all their skills. It also provides details of reform to the funding and training systems.

Person-centred care in 2017 – evidence from service users

National Voices has published a report which provides a snapshot of the extent of person centred care, based on how people report their experience of treatment, care and support. The report concludes there is a need for person-centred care to be given greater priority and a need for a strategic overhaul of what is measured.

New Draft Public Health dashboard for local authorities published

Public Health England has published a new local authority public health dashboard. The dashboard will support local councillors and senior council officers in making decisions on how they prioritise resources across a range of public health service areas. This new tool has been published as an initial version now and Public Health England are seeking suggestions on how to improve it so that a final version can be launched in full in the summer of 2018. It uses existing published data and therefore complements the range of tools PHE provides to support local government in their role as the local leaders for the public's health.

Building Connected Communities

Research from the Local Government Intelligence Unit and Ramblers makes recommendations about health and wellbeing can be promoted and incorporated into the housing and planning process:

- Councils should ensure they have strong policies in place to require connectivity in new developments. Local Plans can be powerful tools if they are well produced, with watertight policies that can be used to enforce walking, active travel and connectivity priorities. They must do more than set out broad principles, but should be clear, detailed and specific.
- Councils need to have greater confidence. They have tools at their disposal, including walking, active travel and public health strategies, as well as Section 106 and Community Infrastructure Levy money, to ensure that their priorities are met.
- Councils should improve their strategic engagement with developers. Developer forums, workshops and online consultations are some of the possible approaches.
- Councils should build links across the council. Many aspects of walking connectivity and active travel involve planning, housing, transport,

highways, and often public health teams. A shared understanding and approach among these different parties is essential.

Hospital re-admissions – trends over time

Healthwatch England have published a new report which consider the rate of hospital readmissions following discharge. The report finds that between 2012/13 - 2016/17 the number of emergency readmissions to hospital rose by 22.8%. In the same period, overall admissions rose by 9.3%. The numbers of emergency readmissions to hospital within 24 hours rose even faster with a 29.2% increase and one in five emergency readmissions take place within 48 hours (21.6%). Healthwatch make recommendations within the report that emergency readmissions data is used alongside other information collected, such as delayed transfers of care, to help understand how well health and social care services are supporting people when they leave hospital.

Public Health and NHS Providers

NHS Providers has published a new report which considers whether Public Health is everyone's business. Through a series of essays from leading NHS and Public Health leaders it explores how NHS trusts can gain a better understanding of how they can shape and deliver public health and care. Specific sections of the report focus on the role of Public Health, STPs and emerging Accountable Care systems.

Children and young people's mental health services

The Care Quality Commission has published review of children and young people's mental health services: phase one report. This first report from the review examines the quality and accessibility of mental health services for children and young people and summarises the current state of knowledge from inspection reports, a review of recent policy and evidence, and engagement with experts. In particular, it confirms the difficulties children and young people have in accessing appropriate support for their mental health concerns from a fragmented system.

Cyber-attack on the NHS

The National Audit Office has published the outcomes of an investigation to the recent cyber-attack on the NHS in a new report and considers the NHS response to the cyber-attack and the impact it had on health services. The report concludes that the attack could have been prevented if the NHS had followed IT security best practice.

Improving access for people with learning disabilities

Public Health England has published a Health Charter for social care providers and accompanying guidance which sets out steps organisation and providers can take to improve the health and wellbeing of people with learning disabilities. Resources include guidance for implementing the charter, a self-assessment tool and a series of short information sheets.

New research shows the Value of Befriending

Derbyshire Trusted Befriending Network has published the findings of new research into the value and impact of voluntary befriending services. The report, Befriending in Derbyshire, found that:

- Loneliness and isolation does not just make people unhappy - it also has a serious impact on physical and mental health and life expectancy.
- Those who receive support from Befriending Services say that it reduces isolation and improves their social and community connections, independence and wellbeing.
- Over 1,100 lonely and isolated people across Derbyshire benefit from over 70,000 hours befriending support given by 765 volunteers from 28 befriending services – if they were all paid for the time they give, this would cost £762,000.
- For every £1 spent on providing volunteering the social benefits and cost savings to other services are worth £8.59.

Thriving at work: the Stevenson/Farmer review of mental health and employers

This report commissioned by the Department of Health and Department for Work and Pensions sets out what employers can do to better support employees to remain healthily in work. It includes detailed analysis of costs of mental health to the economy and how investment in mental health improved productivity. It includes advice for all employers to adopt the six mental health core standards and describes how large employers and the public sector can build on these.

Single Oversight Framework

NHS Improvement has updated its Single Oversight Framework. This document sets out NHS Improvement's approach to overseeing and supporting NHS trusts. It explains what the framework is, how it is applied and how it relates to NHS Improvement's duties and strategic priorities. It is accompanied by separate documentation which sets out the detail of the metrics used to assess performance.

Derbyshire Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment

It is a statutory requirement of both Derbyshire and Derby City Health & Wellbeing Boards to produce a Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment (PNA). Therefore, we would welcome your views as a stakeholder on the Draft PNA. The PNA will identify the pharmaceutical needs of the local population, will support the decision making process for pharmacy applications as well as informing the planning of other services that can be delivered by community pharmacies to meet the health needs of the population.
