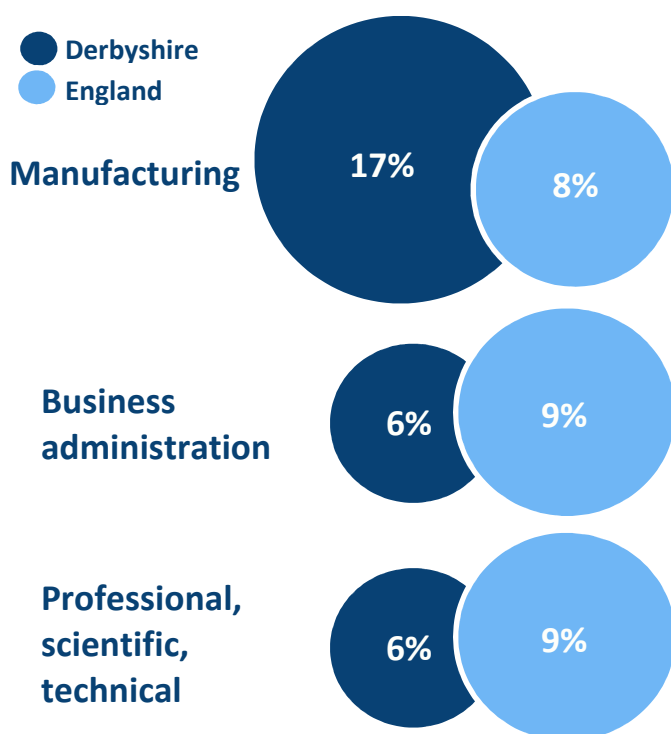

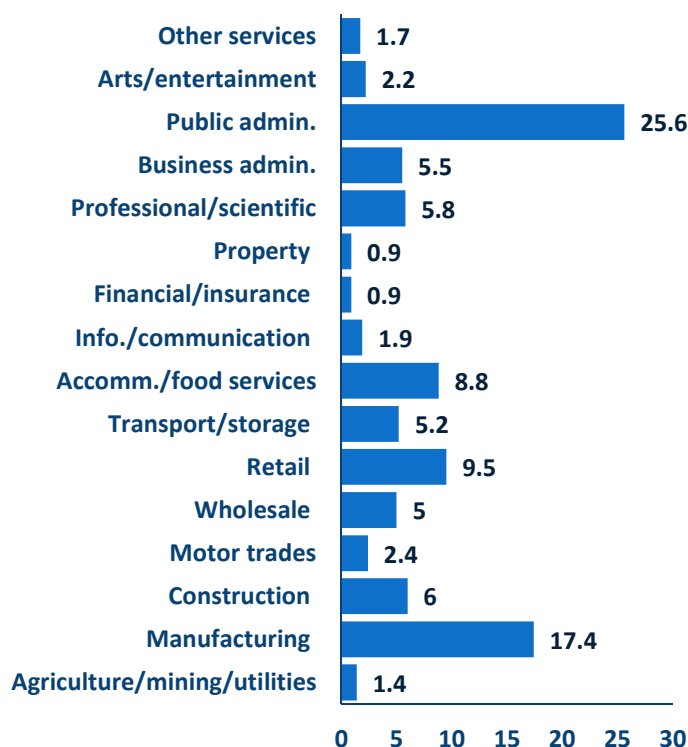
There has been an increase in employees (2,200) since 2015, led by growth in accommodation and food, health and the professional and scientific sector



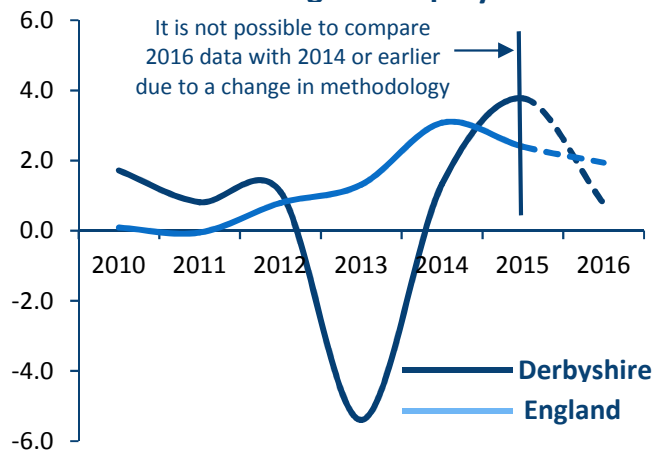
### Key differences between Derbyshire and England

### Employment growth in the county has dipped slightly in 2016 as has that nationally

The **dip in employment in 2013 locally** was due to the loss of **18,200 public sector jobs**, and took employment below that seen after the **2009 recession**

**Bolsover** has experienced large growth (of around 7,000 employees), with **South Derbyshire** and **Chesterfield** also faring well

However, in Derbyshire Dales there has **been a drop of more than 2,000 employees since 2009**, due to a fall in public sector employment in the district

# Earnings in Derbyshire - 2017

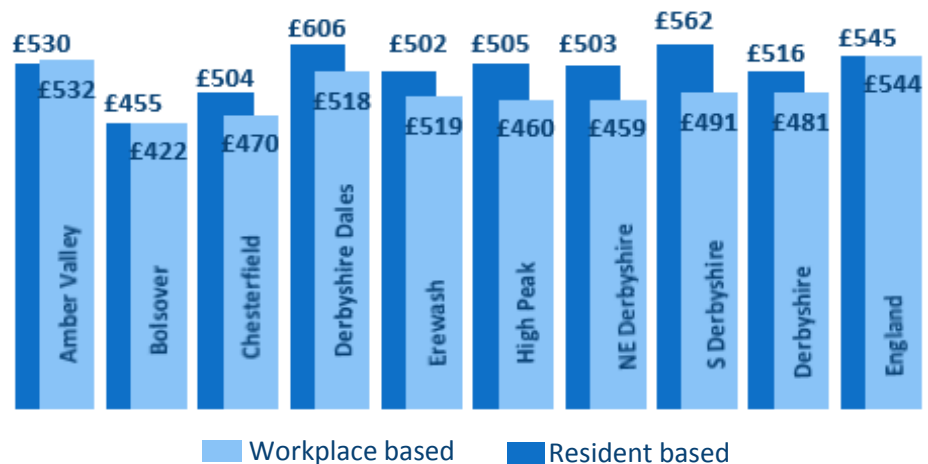


The average weekly earnings of a Derbyshire resident is £530, with an average annual wage of £27,634

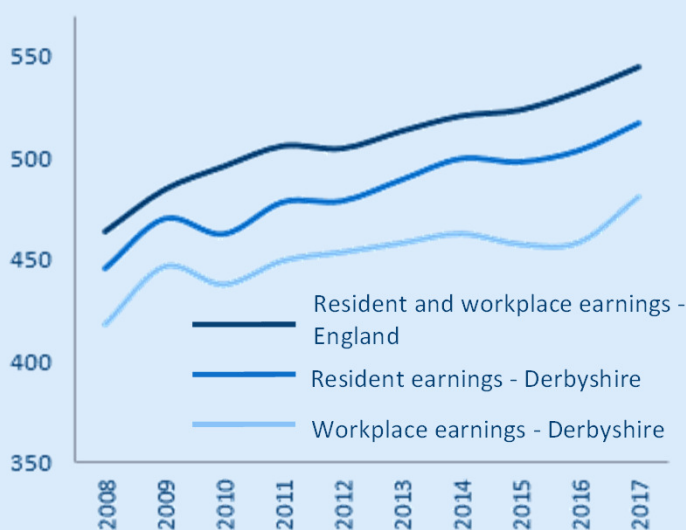
The average weekly wage paid by a Derbyshire business is less at £497. The average annual wage paid by a business is 25,949

## Average weekly earnings of a full-time worker since 2008 (£)



Despite a gradual growth in the level of earnings since 2008, the average weekly wage in Derbyshire remains below that for England. Residents in Derbyshire earn 5% less than the national average and those employed by a Derbyshire business earn 11% less. This reflects the lower skilled employment structure of the county and the travel by some residents out of Derbyshire to work to secure higher wages.
