# PAYMENTS TO COMMUNITY AND VOLUNTARY ORGANISATIONS 2014/15

#### **ADULT SOCIAL CARE**

### 1. Purpose of the Report

To seek Cabinet approval to continue payments to community and voluntary sector organisations for the period 2014/15.

To seek Cabinet approval to jointly review the current invest in the Voluntary and Community Sector (VSC)

# 2. Information and Analysis

To date the Council's investment of over £2.5 million in over 200 services has been maintained despite the savings that have been made elsewhere in the Adult Care budget. For 2014/15 it is proposed to maintain the funding at the same level for each group as in 2013/14.

In light of the budget reduction agreed by Cabinet on 2 October 2013, Adult Care needs to review its priorities for all services areas and this includes the priorities of grant funding to the VCS. This Grant Aid Budget for the VCS is generally intended to support people with less complex needs and to assist them to stay as independent for as long as possible. Many of the funded services referenced in this report have been supported for a long time and came about following requests from the sector for funding.

Funding is allocated in three ways:

- Adult Care has stand-alone grant arrangements with voluntary and community sector providers to deliver a specified service that complements other funded care and support services (These agreements are not subject to joint funding from another agency). Appendix 1 lists these services
- Adult Care alongside the local NHS agrees to jointly finance a voluntary and community sector provider for a specified service. In such cases Adult Care and the local NHS agree the split of funding. Appendix 2 lists these services
- Adult Care provides grant aid to up to 150 small VCS organisations (see Section 2.3 below).

### 2.1 Voluntary and Community Sector Funding

The organisations listed in Appendix 1 are currently in receipt of funding from Adult Care to provide specific care and support services. Cabinet is asked to note the value of these services and to agree that funding of these organisations be extended for the period 2014/15. These services are currently or will be the subject of strategic reviews as set out in 2.5. These reviews will determine their relevance to the current and future commissioning requirements of Adult Care, including their provision across the County and the potential impact of personalisation on their continued funding. Any proposed changes that are identified following these strategic reviews will be presented to Cabinet.

#### 2.2 Joint Finance

Adult Care and local NHS jointly fund agreements with 45 local community and voluntary sector organisations in order to support individual projects or provide specific care and support services (see Appendix 2 for a list of providers and service descriptions). The local NHS has confirmed that it will continue to fund its contributions for 2014/15. As a result of receiving this confirmation, it is proposed that Adult Care's contribution to these services is extended for a further year. Cabinet is asked to note that a number of these services will be the subject of joint strategic reviews in order to determine their relevance in respect of current and future strategic and commissioning requirements of Adult Care and the local NHS. Any review will include consideration of their provision across the County.

2.3 Grants to Luncheon Clubs, Older Persons Clubs and Clubs for Disabled People

Each year, approximately 150 older people's clubs receive small annual payments in order to support their general running expenses. The amount approved is based on expenditure incurred during the previous year, with the maximum amount payable being as follows: -

•	Clubs open full time	£369.00
•	Clubs open three days per week	£219.00
•	Clubs open less than three days per week	£110.00

These services provide valuable community based services that contribute to Derbyshire's Prevention Strategy. The total level of expenditure during 2013/14 is approximately £22,500, with the total level of assistance for 2014/15 projected to be at a similar level. Cabinet may wish to note that in most instances, but not all, grants to these clubs continue to be matched by District and Borough Councils. Continued funding for the luncheon clubs is a high priority.

#### 2.4 Public Health Resource Fund

At the Cabinet meeting held on 21<sup>st</sup> January 2014, approval was given to the continued funding of services commissioned by Adult Care, to be met from the Public Health Resource Fund. The areas that aligned with the Public Health Outcomes Framework and the conditions of the public health ring fenced grant included the following: -

- Services for people at risk of domestic violence
- Substance misuse services
- Befriending services
- Exercise classes

As a result of this decision funding to community and voluntary groups totaling £675,000, previously met by Adult Care, is being met by Public Health for the financial year 2014/15.

2.5 Voluntary and Community Sector Investment in Health and Social Care

The Derbyshire Health and Wellbeing Board agreed on the 6<sup>th</sup> February 2014 for a project to be set up to:

• Understand the totality of public sector investment in the voluntary and community sector in relation to health and social care.

- Evaluate and prioritise investment based on a set of shared outcomes taking account of any budget constraints being faced by all of the partners.
- Develop a single commissioning process including contract monitoring and evaluation.

The outcomes of this project will identify opportunities for greater budget alignment and make recommendations for continued investment or disinvestment going forward. This work will be undertaken in the context of the budget reductions faced by Adult Care for 2015/2018.

A Cabinet Report will be presented at the completion of this project detailing the recommendations from the Health and Wellbeing Board. Any proposals to disinvest and or re-commission services may have implications for people receiving services funded by Adult Care and if this is the case a period of consultation will be required. The length of the consultation will be a minimum of 12 weeks.

Particular consideration will need to be given in this instance to communicating with any hard to reach groups which do not receive a service directly through Adult Care but rather through an organisation funded by Adult Care.

The Cabinet Report that will summarise the outcome of any consultation will also include any proposals to disinvest Adult Care funding from VCS. Providers affected by any of the proposals will then receive a minimum of 3 months notice of the change of funding in line with the Derbyshire Compact Agreement. It is expected that the first impact of any change to funding would commence at the earliest from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2015.

#### 3. Financial Considerations

All the proposed allocations set out in Appendix 1 and 2 are based on funding agreed in respect of the 2013/2014 year.

The proposed allocation of £2,574,999 can be met from the appropriate Adult Care and Public Health budgets.

#### 4. Human Resource Considerations

As all the above are community and voluntary organisations none of the staff involved are employed by Derbyshire County Council. However, with regard to any organisation providing services to children or vulnerable adults,

approval of financial support is conditional on the existence within these organisations of appropriate statutory procedures assessing suitability to work with children or vulnerable adults.

## 5. Legal Considerations

The Director of Legal Services has advised that any proposals would need to be subject to a programme of full consultation and that the process of consultation detailed in the report is appropriate and proportionate.

When considering the proposals it will be essential for Members to have due regard to protecting and providing the welfare and interests of persons who share a relevant protected characteristic (age; disability; gender reassignment; marriage and civil partnership; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex and sexual orientation). The proposals will, therefore, be subject to Equality Impact Assessment and these will be prepared in the light of the consultation and will be included within the further report to Cabinet.

# 6. Equal Opportunity Considerations

Payments to any organisation are dependent upon the insistence that the organisation agreeing to adhere to Derbyshire County Council's Equal Opportunities' policies.

Alongside the consultation process an Equality Impact Assessment (EIA) will need to be completed. Adult Care will commission a group to undertake this work. This may involve non-Council staff and clients to ensure an independent input into the report. The EIA will focus on the potential impact of any proposal on groups with protected characteristics as well as detailing the mitigation that can be put in place.

The EIA report will pay close regard to the views expressed in the consultation and will be presented to Cabinet alongside the outcome of any consultation.

#### 7. Other Considerations

In preparing this report the relevance of the following factors has been considered: - prevention of crime and disorder; and environmental, health and property considerations.
