

Horse riding for everyone...

Derbyshire is the perfect place to explore on horse back. Traffic-free trails, bridleways and byways connect beautiful countryside and quiet villages through green hills and rugged open moorland.



Whether starting out on a new hobby, searching for new riding routes or looking for a riding adventure, this leaflet will help you find the right path. Use the contacts listed below for more detailed information about routes and riding centres.



Enjoy Safe Horse Riding

Wherever you ride it makes sense to stay safe and enjoy your visit by being prepared. The following suggestions and good practices may be helpful:

Safety and Good Practice

You should wear: A horse riding helmet approved to British Standards, a high visibility jacket and suitable horse riding clothing.

Shared paths: Be aware of and considerate to other path users. Vehicles may be met on some off-road routes for farm access, 4x4 and trail bike leisure or for path maintenance.

Road routes: Derbyshire County Council will continue to improve the comfort and safety of road routes, but special care should be taken when riding where other vehicular traffic is present. The British Horse Society can provide details of how to gain road safety training for horse riders.

Highway crossings and road safety: Pegasus crossings have been installed where promoted trails cross major highways. Warning signs and road markings are also used to inform vehicles of highway crossings. Corral barriers are being erected at some sites for the safety of riders approaching the highway.

Horse box and trailer parking: It should be noted that all sites vary in numbers of spaces, size of area, accessibility and charges. It is recommended that a parking location is checked before a visit is made. Please remove any horse droppings from car parking sites.

Where legal: Horse riders are allowed to use off-road paths that are designated byways, restricted byways and bridleways as well as publicised trails and where private landowners permit.

Path surfaces: Greenways are usually level, surfaced and free draining. Other routes offer a wide variety of surfaces and path conditions



In an emergency: It may be useful to locate the nearest veterinary practice or farrier prior to a ride. In the case of an emergency or serious accident, call the emergency services informing them if you require assistance for your horse.

Plan your route: If leading the way, plan your route thoroughly and be sure that it is suitable for the abilities of your party. Always carry a map or route card should you get into difficulty and need an alternative plan.

Derbyshire's Horse Riding Network

Discover Derbyshire from a new perspective. There are almost 600kms of **Public Rights of Way** open to horse riders and over 200kms of **Greenways**, or countryside trails.

The Pennine Bridleway, a National Trail, meanders through the hills and Greenways and runs through the valleys. The bridleway network across the County is growing and links with Public Rights of Way are being improved to create better circuits and better connections.

Where to ride and who you might meet

- U Greenways and trails** - horse riders, cyclists, walkers, wheelchairs and motorised scooters.
- U Public bridleways** - horse riders, cyclists and walkers.
- U Restricted byways** - horse and carriage, horse riders, cyclists and walkers.
- U Byways open to all traffic** - cars, motorbikes, horse and carriage, horse riders, cyclists and walkers.
- U Permissive routes** - across private land, some landowners might impose charges.
- U** Other horse riding locations shown on the map.

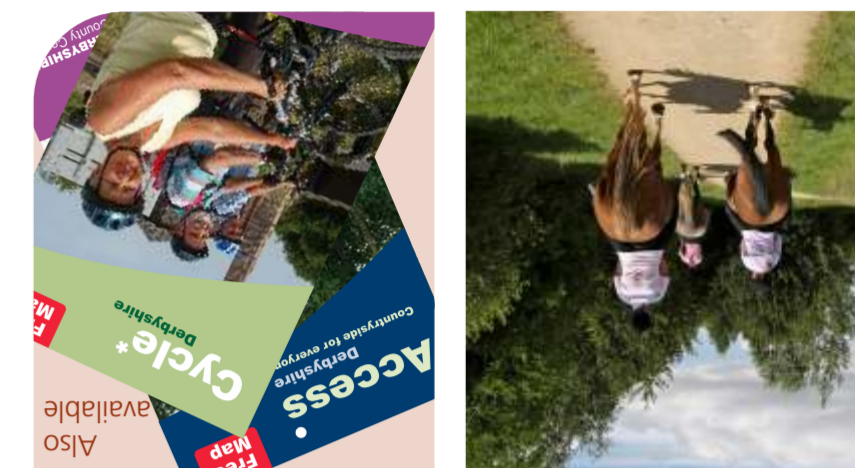
