









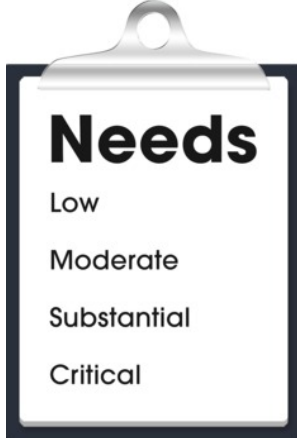
SYMBOL	TERM AND DEFINITION
	<p>Abuse When someone hurts another person, either physically, by not looking after them, or their money properly, or sexually hurting them.</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;">Adult Social Care</p>	<p>Adult Social Care Care and support services for people who are not able to care for themselves.</p>
 <p style="text-align: center;">Assessment</p>	<p>Assessment When your worker asks you questions about what you need, and talks to you about how to make that happen.</p>
	<p>Aids and Adaptations Equipment or changes to buildings to help people live in their own homes.</p>
	<p>Benefits Money from the Government to help you pay for your living costs.</p>
	<p>Co-funding The amount of money you may need to pay Adult Care towards the costs of your services.</p>

Referral

When someone asks a service provider to find out what your needs are.



Review

To see if your needs have changed. To check the support you are getting is still right.



Self Directed Support

Choosing how you wish to be looked after and supported.



Social Worker

An adult care worker who works with individual people and families to make their lives better.



Support Plan

A written plan which says how you need to be support and how this will happen
