Vicki Cauldwell did an unplanned visit to Golding Grange and was happy with how they were storing packed lunches. She also said that it was not in the centre's contract that they had to provide hot food. Vicki is continuing to look into whether the consultation about the change to cold meals was done in the right way. Jackie Fleeman was worried about packed lunches being less healthy than hot meals and also whether a packed lunch could be made safe for somebody who might choke or breathe in food
