Getting the help you need

If you have a need for social care support, an assessment is available. This assessment will look at the results you would like to achieve and will consider your eligibility for formal support.

The aim of the assessment is to work with you to identify your social care needs, consider your eligibility for formal services and give you support to find the help you may need.

Other Adult Social Care Services

Short term reablement service

This service is for Derbyshire adults who are likely to benefit from short-term support. You will be assessed and referred to the short-term service which is usually provided in your own home.

The care workers will support you alongside health care professionals where appropriate to achieve your maximum level of independence. The service is not subject to community contribution arrangements and is therefore 'free at the point of entry'.

When you have reached your maximum level of independence, we will look again at your care needs and discuss them with you.

If at the end of your service, ongoing care and support needs are identified, longer term

services will be arranged and these will be subject to the relevant community contribution arrangements.

On-going support

Derbyshire Adult Social Care directly provides many other specialist services for people with eligible needs. These include residential care homes offering respite or long-term care, home care services, day opportunities and others.

Adult Social Care provides a range of mental health services in collaboration with Derbyshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust. Specialist mental health services can also be accessed via your GP.

How Services are provided

Personal budgets

As part of your assessment, we will help you identify your needs and priorities and, if you are eligible, we will agree with you a support plan and personal budget.

Your personal budget can either be paid directly to you to enable you to manage your support (a Direct Payment) or it can be held by the county council who will manage the support on your behalf (Virtually Managed budget). Alternatively, you can have a combination of the two.

Direct Payments

You can receive some or all of your Personal Budget as a Direct Payment. A Direct Payment is an agreed amount of money from Adult Social Care that you can use to meet your eligible needs. You may want to employ a personal assistant or buy services from an independent care agency. It is not possible to use Direct Payments to pay for Adult Social Care in-house services.

Community Contribution

Most people will need to make a financial contribution. You will be asked to contribute if you are receiving either Attendance Allowance or the care component of Disability Living Allowance / Personal Independence Payment (PIP) and your weekly income is high enough to be considered eligible. If you have £23,250 or more of capital assets (not including the capital in your main home) you will not be eligible for Adult Social Care funded support.

Information for Carers – Carers Assessment

A carer is someone who provides unpaid support to another person, usually a relative or friend, in their day-to-day life. You may be providing practical, emotional, or supervisory support to someone who is ill or frail, has a physical or learning disability, poor mental health, or substance/alcohol dependency.

Our Derbyshire All Age Carers Support Service (DAACSS) which is delivered by Derbyshire Carers Association on our behalf, offers support services for young carers, young adult carers and adult carers across the county who are aged 18 and over and caring for an adult.

All carers with a need for support are entitled to an assessment, regardless of the amount or type of care they provide. A carers assessment will help you to identify the areas where you may need support and can identify the resources that could make caring easier for you.
